Special guest Rowena Alegría, Chief Storyteller for Denver and a film producer, will present the *I AM Denver* documentary film "Chicanas: Nurturers and Warriors". Alegría will share insights into the interviews for this film with such notable women as Latino Cultural Arts Center founder Adrianna Abarca, former SBA Director Patricia Barela Rivera, healthcare activist Charlene Barrientos Ortiz, activist Nita Gonzales, State Senator Lucia Guzman, former City Council President Ramona Martinez, performer and activist Yolanda Ortega and Denver's godmother of Montessori Martha Urioste.

Following the screening, Andrea Malcomb, Director of Historic Denver's Molly Brown House Museum will share stories of some of Denver's historically notable women. The afternoon will conclude with an inspiring panel discussion with Alegría and Daphne Rice-Allen, Board Chair of the Black American West Museum, and scholar/author Dr. Marcia Goldstein. Together they'll discuss the women of Denver - past, present, and future – to reveal how they have and continue to shape our dynamic city.

After her death in 1932, her Victorian home was sold and used for many different functions.
